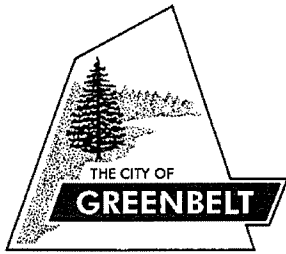

City Manager's Report Week Ending April 28, 2017

1. Was briefed by Ms. Bellah along with Woodlawn staff regarding the North Core Trail. Staff and Woodlawn are participating in WMATA/City staff meetings on the trail. Staff has shared ideas to address issues such as trail placement, the type of access provided to the City, and the timeframe of access. Additional challenges to overcome include cost. Further update to come with more detail.
2. Met with representatives of Woodlawn along with Ms. Celia Craze and Ms. Jessica Bellah. Woodlawn will soon announce continued shuttle service. Ms. Bellah has confirmed with County staff that County bus service will also continue to Greenbelt Station neighborhood. Mr. Michael Goldsmith shared that the shuttle and bus schedules should complement each other and address residents' concerns about frequency. Woodlawn is preparing outreach to communicate with residents including written communication and a community forum. The company noted that while the last outreach effort on shuttle and bus service was planned in advance, several unanticipated factors overtook the effort including the announcement of SafeTrack repairs. As noted during this week's verbal manager's report, County bus service to Greenbelt Station is provided through a Woodlawn/County agreement and at least ten daily boardings to meet County performance measures. Woodlawn has confirmed that even with the shuttle service restored, the builder will continue to fund County bus service through 2018.
3. Please note that Green Ridge House's smoking area is on the GHI Board agenda. As noted in prior email, a GHI resident complained about residents smoking at the bus stop and reached out to neighbors for ideas. Similarly, city staff from public works, CARES, and Green Ridge House identified an alternative location at the rear of the property near the tree line (attached photos and email). The proposals are being sought to address topographic issues including drainage is being investigated and Estimates are being sought. Interim solutions are being sought to address the immediate concern of the bus stop location.
4. Attached please find an update on Green Ridge House inspections from Ms. Christal Batey.
5. Requested that a public meeting application for a private firm's special event be deferred to address several issues including a scheduling conflict with the Green Man Festival. Staff will work to help address these issues. The matter raised the need to revisit the current application and related guidelines.

6. Worked with legal counsel and staff on a variety of items including Collective Bargaining, personnel matters, and staff activities at the County Planning Board regarding North Core.
7. Met with Ms. Mary Johnson and Mr. Jeff Williams regarding changes to employee health insurance, employee outreach, and supplemental occupational health and wellness activities to explore for employees.
8. Met with Mr. Toby Bozzuto of The Bozzuto Group.
9. Attended the Greenbelt Rotary Club. College Park Mayor Patrick Wojahn was the guest speaker and shared updates on the recent apartment fire as well as various upcoming development including new upscale restaurants, and the joint University of Maryland/new City Hall facility.
10. Attended the Golden Age Club Anniversary Luncheon.
11. Attended the Four Cities Meeting. Follow-up materials are being submitted to Berwyn Heights and New Carrollton regarding the County's tax differential notice. As noted in email, Police staff confirmed that effort was already underway to address speed camera contracts.
12. Ms. Liz Park confirmed that CARES has planned a variety of community activities regarding grief counseling and suicide prevention following this week's unfortunate loss. This will include grief counseling support groups held on Mondays from May 1-May 15, 2017 from 7:30-8:30pm in the Municipal Building.
13. Reminder that a fundraiser for CARES will be held at Chipotle on Sunday, April 30, 2017. 50% of proceeds from sales between 2-9pm will support CARES-show the flyer in the email sent to Council, show the flyer on a smartphone, or tell the cashier that you are supporting the fundraiser to make sure the purchase supports CARES.
14. Will visit the Community Shred scheduled for Saturday, April 29, 2017.

Richard,

Thank you. I appreciate everyone working together and making a recommendation on a long-term site behind Green Ridge House.

As this is being scoped, what interim location(s) does the group recommend? Given GHI's nuisance complaints about Green Ridge House residents smoking at the bus stop and leaving a pan of cigarette butts at the stop, another location is needed instead of the bus stop. I suggested the benches on the same side of the street as Green Ridge House to stop the nuisance complaints at the bus stop, or to create a pad at the eastern exit (currently mulched). Also someone needs to make sure that the pan is removed from the bus stop; receptacles should be placed at the interim location.

I have copied Eldon to keep him up to date.

Ms. Ard,

Public Works staff have reviewed the conditions at Green Ridge House regarding the Smoking Area proposal. We also met with Ms. Potts, Community Director at the Green Ridge House, and spoke with Christal Batey.

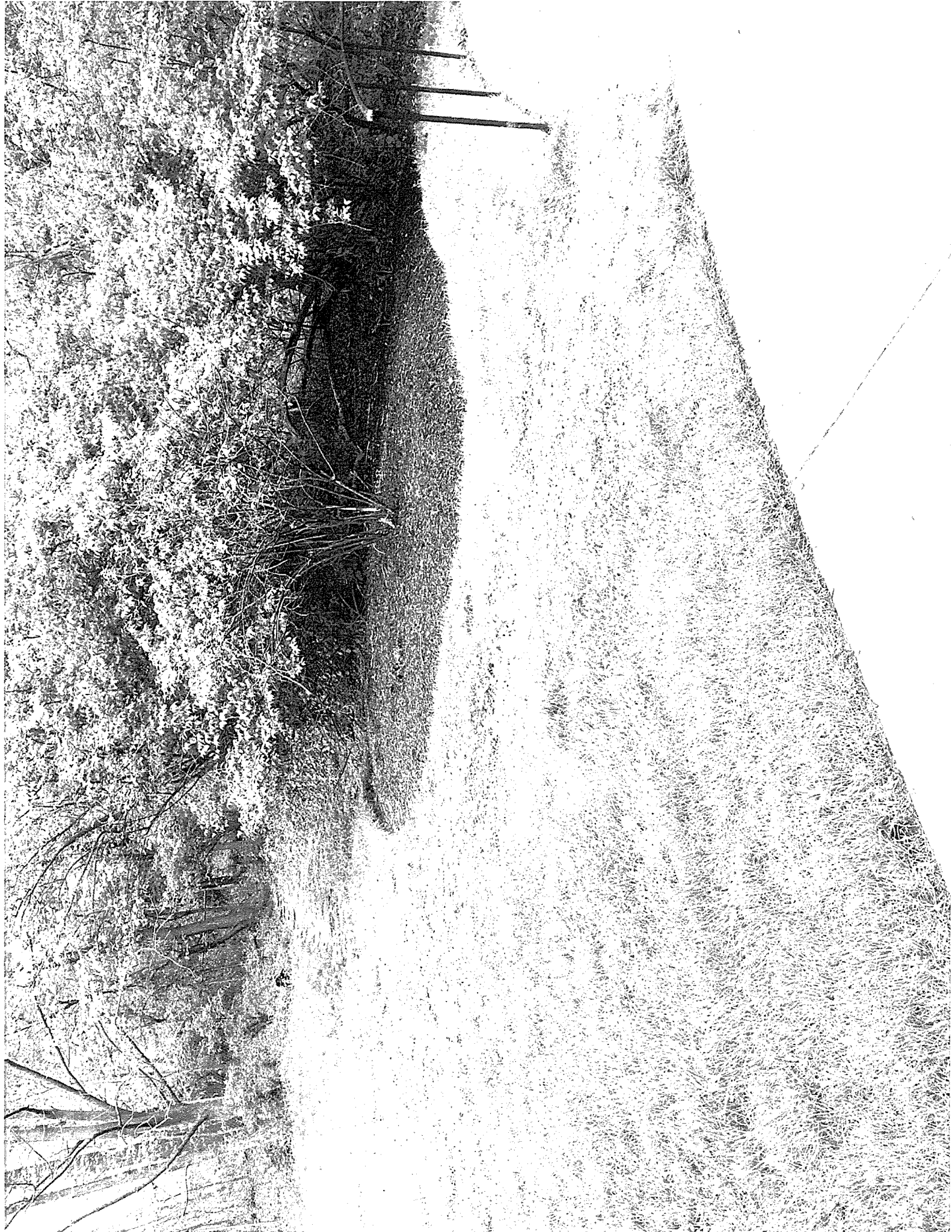
We would recommend that an 8' x 10' concrete pad be placed near the rear corner of the property woodline (see attached pictures). This is an area where an informal pedestrian trail has been created from the property and through the woods. The pad would connect with the existing sidewalk via a 55' x 4' concrete path.

We selected this location for several reasons. First, this is the only feasible location on the property that can be made to be ADA compliant without a major construction project. Second, this is the furthest possible point from the building that can provide handicap accommodation while also dampening some of the noise created by smokers. By placing the smoking area in this location, it will simultaneously help to solve an existing erosion problem that is occurring on the pedestrian trail. Finally, we strongly recommend against having any smoking area placed in front of the building as it interferes with citizens walking through the neighborhood and also creates a negative first impression to visitors of the building.

We estimate the work would cost around \$2000.

Re: Status of Inspections at Green Ridge House

Green Ridge House (GRH) Apartments has seven entities that inspect the property annually with the exception of Real Estate Assessment Center (REAC). They are the City of Greenbelt Code Enforcement, the Prince George's County Fire Marshal, Prince George's County Fire Department, Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD) Physical and DHCD Financial and Housing and Urban Development (HUD) if warranted. When REAC scores are above 80 points inspections occur every three years and for 2017 DHCD has waived the financial inspection requirements for GRH due to high scores in previous years.

Timeline:

November 22, 2016 – Green Ridge House had their initial REAC inspection. Management appealed the inspection but completed all repairs noted in the report except for the concrete renovation work required for the front and rear patios. As part of the appeal process GRH was required to undergo a third party REAC inspection.

March 23 & 24, 2017 – Green Ridge House had the third party inspection completed by INSPECTUS. This resulted in an 85 page report of items that needed to be addressed. Please see the status of those items below:

- **Building Exterior** – we are in the process of obtaining bids from roofing contractors to replace and/or repair the roof.
- **Common Areas** – any cracked or damaged outlets are being replaced by in-house maintenance staff. The painters are currently working in the building and working through the common areas then to individual apartments to make drywall repairs and paint. All common area windows with broken seals have been ordered and will be replaced (see attached proposal “B”).
- **Apartments**
 - Windows that needed repair and/or replacement have been ordered. Any not functioning or damaged window hardware has been ordered (see attached proposal “B”).
 - In-house maintenance staff is in the process of replacing all outlet and/or switch plates that have cracks.
 - All inoperable outlets or GFI outlets are in the process of being replaced by in-house maintenance staff.

- Our painting contractor is currently working through the common areas and when complete will begin working in apartments to make drywall repairs and paint.
- Eleven (11) refrigerators have been ordered to replace all refrigerators with cracked gaskets.
- In-house maintenance staff is repairing and/or replacing all minor deficiencies that were found throughout the building.

Management is currently addressing the items listed in the report and projects that all items will be corrected by June 30, 2017 including the concrete work identified in the November 22, 2016 report. (Please note this date is based on optimal weather conditions.)

March 30, 2017 – The Department of Housing and Community Development conducted a physical inspection and of the 15 units inspected only minor cosmetic repairs were cited. Seven of the units were cited due to cracked caulking in the bathroom or kitchen, one unit had a broken window and there was a loose handrail found in the common area. All of these findings have been corrected.

As of April 25, 2017 all status updates on repairs have been submitted to DHCD and have been accepted.

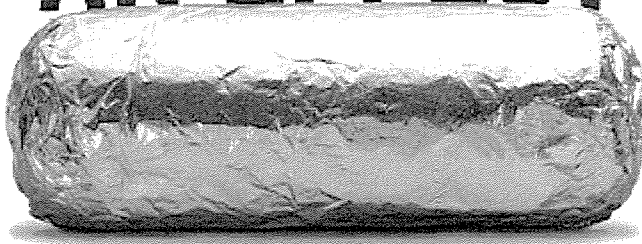

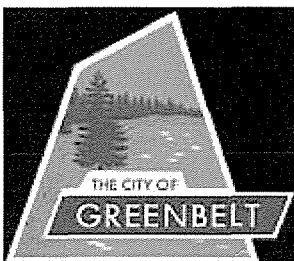

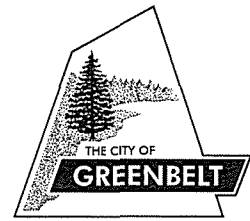

Hoarding Task Force meeting.

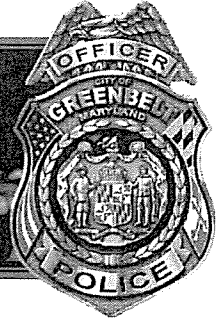
