

City Manager's Report Week Ending October 7, 2016

- 1. Attached is a memo recommending the entire site/campus of Green Ridge House be made smoke-free. I understand some Green Ridge House residents who smoke raised a concern about this at the recent picnic. Staff will proceed with this proposal as outlined, like any other operational matter, especially given the lead time, unless Council members indicate they would like another process. Information about the change will be posted along with the information about the smoking cessation program.
- 2. Met with Chief Craze and Captain Kemp to talk transition upon Chief Craze's retirement. Captain Kemp is confident of a smooth transition.
- 3. Met with Chief Craze, Captain Kemp, Lieutenant Pracht and Sergeant White on body cameras for the officers. The department is preparing a report and recommendation for Council's consideration in November or December. In brief, the department was pleased with the pilot program. The cost has increased due to requirements approved by the General Assembly last session to increase the retention requirement from 90 days to 366 days. Staff believes the program is still affordable for the city and will present proposals in the report.
- 4. Met with Public Works Director, City Treasurer and Assistant City Manager to review the Director's recommendations on the final HVAC needs at the Aquatic & Fitness Center. Additional research is being done.
- 5. Coordinated next steps with Joellen Earl of GovHR in the city manager recruitment process.
- 6. Exploring with Zipcar locating a second car near Municipal Building.
- 7. Assistant City Manager
 - a. Along with Museum Director, Public Works staff and others, continued to assess and mitigate flood damage at the Museum.
 - b. Prepared for a CRAB meeting on October 11.
 - c. Worked with CRAB members to identify potential facilitators for police/community dialogue sessions.
 - d. Drafted an Ordinance to implement a Renters Tax Credit program in Greenbelt.
 - e. Developed background information on the Community Pledge. The Pledge will be distributed to all City employees.

 - a. Held follow-up meeting with representatives from Columbia Bank to discuss lock box collection services, and credit card chip reading technology.

Re: Smoke Free Campus for Green Ridge House

In an effort to improve the health quality and peaceful enjoyment at Green Ridge House, the Management Staff and the Greenbelt Assistance in Living Program would like to transition the property to becoming a smoke free campus. In July 2010, Green Ridge House became a smoke free building and required all residents to sign an addendum to their lease, making them aware of the designated smoking areas and the change to a smoke free building.

Around the same time, smoking was prohibited within 25 feet of any building entrance. We continue to get complaints from residents regarding the designated areas due to the second-hand smoke that would seep into the apartments of residents near the smoking area as well as the loud noise and foul language associated with the residents who use the area. In addition, maintaining the cleanliness of the area has been an ongoing battle even to the point of having a couple of small fires. Effective August 1, 2016, the smoking areas was moved 25 ft. from the building, therefore eliminating the patio smoking area, which is located right next to the building. Every time someone exited or entered the building smoke was entering the building and it prevented many people from using the patio area. Currently the only area designated for smoking is located on the back of the picnic area. Since this change went into effect management has received many compliments from residents. This has allowed many non-smoking residents to use both the terrace level patio and the 1st floor balcony (located directly above the old smoking area).

Unfortunately, residents on the East and South Wings of the building who face the picnic area are now complaining about the loud talking and foul language at very late hours (1:00am – 4:00am). Currently there are 18 residents who are smokers out of our current population of 100. The GAIL Program in partnership with the Prince George's County Health Department and the Washington Adventist University Graduate School of Nursing will be offering a free Smoking Cessation Programs at Green Ridge House and the Community Center beginning in November. Classes and nicotine replacement therapy supplies will be provided free of charge. Sessions will be open to residents and staff and will meet once a week for five weeks.

In an effort to continue to improve the health of Green Ridge House residents, it is our recommendation that the entire campus of Green Ridge House Apartments become smoke free on February 1, 2017. For residents, who do not wish to quit there is a bench located on Ridge Road across from the property where residents could smoke.



During the month of September, 15 families on average were seen for counseling at CARES. Sixty-five individuals on average came on a weekly basis among whom twenty-one were 18 years of age and younger. The CICs (Crisis Intervention Counselors) saw six clients.

Councilmember Todd Turner's office provided 10 Harvest Feast Applications to Greenbelt CARES families. Harvest Feast is a county program to provide free thanksgiving baskets to county residents.


