This office has received your email of April 15, 2015 in which you've suggested that WSSC should proceed with design of our water pipeline replacement along the City's Ridge Road public dedication without cost-sharing participation by the City of Greenbelt. The City's apparent decision to consider participation in offsetting project design and construction costs at a future time is a disappointing development; it leaves WSSC in the untenable position of shouldering all the costs going forward until such time as the City will reconsider their participation. As stated in our earlier correspondence, WSSC is concerned about significant additional costs associated with stabilizing the steep slopes along the City's Ridge Road public dedication. My staff has determined that there is clear evidence of existing and persistent drainage and erosion problems in the vicinity of the proposed waterline relocation.

WSSC made numerous attempts to work with the City to develop a waterline replacement alignment that would reduce impacts to the existing adjacent properties while enhancing our ability to maintain a safe, reliable water supply to the City and surrounding areas. Following the City of Greenbelt's Work Session of December 17, 2014, our staff felt confident that we had the support of not only the adjacent residents but the City Council and staff as well. Unfortunately, WSSC cannot accept sole responsibility for costs associated with correction of existing conditions beyond the scope of our waterline replacement.

As the City of Greenbelt is currently unwilling to participate in a cost-sharing agreement based upon the preferred pipe alignment and WSSC has exhausted attempts to acquire an easement for an alternative alignment across the Jones' property, there remains no option but to design the 20-inch waterline utilizing the existing WSSC easement. Replacement of the 20-inch waterline in the original location will result in impacts to the

adjacent property owners as any existing trees, shrubs, fences, sheds, play equipment and other items located within our easement will require removal. At this time, it is believed that acquisition of additional WSSC easements (adjacent to the original 15 foot easement) will not be necessary. However, final easement needs will be verified during preparation of detailed design plans.

WSSC's Technical Services Group will soon begin contacting the impacted property owners to notify them of pending survey / flagging work and arranging for access to the backyards of the various properties. This will allow WSSC to document specific construction impacts across each of the impacted residential properties and ascertain that no additional easement will be required.

Dear Chair Middleton & Members of the Committee:

Pepco, the City's electric utility, has proposed significant "vegetation management" work in the City of Greenbelt as part of its Reliability Enhancement Program. This proposed work could result in the removal of approximately 375 trees along City streets and on City open space and parkland. In addition, Pepco plans to remove at least 150 other trees on private property and conduct a large amount of pruning work. Past pruning activities by Pepco and their contractors has resulted in disfigured trees.

It takes decades for a tree to mature. Pepco will replace large mature street trees with small (2 to 2.5 inch caliper) specimens. Pepco has refused reasonable requests from the City to: grind stumps after tree removal, water newly planted replacement trees, give a longer notice period (currently 7 days) to homeowners who are affected and provide comprehensive maps of the project illustrating the impact City-wide.

Since this project was first proposed, Pepco has been contacting individual homeowners to secure permission to remove trees on their property. Some of these homeowners report "intimidation" tactics including warnings that homeowners will be liable if the tree falls on a power line. Homeowners have not been advised they can deny permission for tree removal and only allow Pepco to trim trees. In fact, Pepco's door hanger (attached) notice makes no mention of this denial option.

Electric reliability is important, but it must be balanced against the value and benefit of our urban tree canopies which are an essential element to the health and livability of our communities. Trees provide aesthetic and environmental benefits. Greenbelt is a historic planned community and part of the original plan was the preservation of trees and forests. In fact, the name Greenbelt refers to the belt of "green, undeveloped, forested land" that surrounded the original Town.

In 2013, the General Assembly passed legislation (HB 587) prohibiting local governments from adopting or enforcing a law, rule or regulation that interferes with an electric company's Vegetation Management program. The City urges the General Assembly to repeal this legislation. Local governments deserve a voice regarding the appearance and maintenance of the trees in our communities.

How Does Pepco Decide What Needs to be Done?

Pepco's Vegetation Management program is an ongoing endeavor that occurs in your neighborhood approximately every 2-4 years. It is important proactive work that reduces the likelihood to experience a power outage when a storm does occur. We organize our workload by feeder or circuit, which are the wires that bring the power to your neighborhood and home. Certified Arborists perform a pole span by pole span evaluation of trees and vegetation in order to create a work plan for tree crews. They look for trees and vines that will eventually develop a conflict with the electric facilities. They also look for dead, dying, hazardous trees and tree conditions prone to causing power outages.

What Standards Does Pepco and their Contractors Adhere to?


Pepco contractors are required to adhere to tree care standards established by American National Standards Institute (ANSI) A-300. Our prescriptions are based on Best Management Practices (BMP's) established by the International Society of Arboriculture (ISA). State or District laws requiring minimum clearances from electrical conductors, may also impact how trees are pruned or if they should be removed. Utility vegetation management Arborists are required to bide by Safety Standards set in ANSI Z133 and are regulated by OSHA.


Who Oversees the Work?

Pepco has a large staff of trained Foresters and Certified Arborists who oversee the work of our contractors. Our contractors are Licensed Tree Experts; their work is subject to inspections by Maryland Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and the District of Columbia's Urban Forestry Administration (UFA). Maryland and District of Columbia's Public Service Commission (PSC) set regulations to ensure that Pepco properly maintains vegetation away from electric wires.

How Will My Tree Look After it is Pruned?


Tree species, its position in relation to our electric facilities, and the line voltage are all factors in determining how much limb removal is required and the shape the tree takes. If a tree is going to be maintained in the vicinity of electric wires, Arborists use a method called directional pruning to steer tree growth away from wires. Figures 1 and 2 demonstrate typical shapes a tree may assume after directional pruning.





What About Tree Removal?

Our work planners may suggest the entire cut down of a tree if a large percentage of a crown needs to be pruned, if the tree has no space to grow, or if the tree has no acceptable branches to directionally prune back to. These are trees that

would be left unhealthy and unsightly if we were to "just prune" them.


Removal might also be required where a tree is near our primary wires and it is dying or leaning toward them, or if it is a fast-growing/weak-wooded tree such as a Sycamore, Silver Maple, Willow, Poplar, or Pine. If a tree needs to be removed, we encourage replacement trees to be low-growing species if planted back in the same place (see Right Tree, Right Place section).

What is Tree Line USA?



Tree Line USA® is a program of the National Arbor Day Foundation and the National Association of State Foresters that recognizes utilities that demonstrate best practices in utility arboriculture. Utilities that are

recognized with this honor must have a program that ensures proper tree pruning, employee training, tree planting, public education, and a tree based energy conservation program. Pepco has received this designation every year since 2001.



Right Tree, Right Place

YOU CAN PREVENT FUTURE TREE-ELECTRIC LINE PROBLEMS

Trees help make our environment beautiful. They brighten our neighborhoods and lend shade to our sidewalks and homes. But when a tree that will grow either too large or too tall, is planted under or near electrical power lines, that beautiful tree can cause power outages, property damage, or even injury to people or animals.

The National Arbor Day Foundation advocates a policy of "right tree, right place," under which all trees are planted where they can thrive and will not interfere with essential public infrastructure such as electric power lines. Pepco advocates this policy as well and has been certified as a Tree Line USA Utility since 2001. Please see the National Arbor Day Foundation for more information on the Tree Line USA program. Here's a helpful guide to the right tree, right place approach.

Tall Trees Tall trees such as Maple, Sycamore, Oak, Spruce, Pine and Birch should be planted well away from wires – more than 50 feet to the side.

Medium Trees Medium trees that grow to a height of 40 feet or less, such as Honey locust, Serviceberry or Hornbeam, should be planted at least 20 feet from power lines.

Small Trees Small trees that grow slowly and to no more than 25 feet in height, such as Dogwood, flowering Cherry, Crabapple, purple leaf Plum and Japanese Maple are recommended for areas close to power lines.

Greenbelt to participate in first ever multi-Municipality evening mass casualty drill

Cooperation is a major factor in any disaster scenario. The Community Emergency Response Teams (C.E.R.T.) of Berwyn Heights along with the cities of Greenbelt and Laurel will jointly respond to a disaster scenario at the Berwyn Heights Elementary School on the evening of September 12th, 2015 to practice procedures in disaster response including search and rescue, mass casualty care and a full deployment of emergency assets. Deploying these assets, locating and treating casualties is to be the focus of the night's exercise.

The three municipalities have a long history of cooperation and training together. It is understood that in any real life disaster they may be called upon to help their neighboring municipality. An important feature of this exercise is that the drill is not encumbering major municipal government resources or management. Rather, the operation is being staffed and managed by organized and trained citizen volunteer C.E.R.T groups dedicated to first response capabilities including search and rescue procedures, triage, first-aid and other disaster related disciplines.

HORTICULTURE/PARKS


