

- Supervisor continued to field inquires in regard to food operation rentals for the Commercial Kitchen. There have been 414 inquiries since April 2015. There are currently four food operations who received all permits and may rent the Kitchen.
- There were 6 facility reservations processed.
- There were 7 private rentals and 14 pattern rentals.
- The following free space groups were provided space: Golden Age Club, Greenbelt Concert Band, Greenbelt MakerSpace and Friends of the Greenbelt Museum.
- The following city groups were provided space: Be Happy, Be Healthy Volleyball, Yoga & Pickleball, CARES, Senior Citizen's Advisory Committee and City Council.

ARTS:

- Dance and fiber arts workshops are being held today for Greenbelt Elementary School second grade students through the Artward Bound program.
- A Community Art Drop-in will take place on Sunday, May 5 at the Community Center. Guests can make a hand-built ceramic mug with Gina Denn, Artist in Residence. Advance registration for this activity is full; a few seats will be available at 1pm and 2pm on a walk-up basis.
- A raku firing will also be held on Sunday, May 5, outside the Greenbelt Aquatic and Fitness Center. Raku is a fast-firing technique for ceramics which imparts unique surface effects through the use of combustible materials. Metallic finishes and other colorful surfaces can be achieved through glazing, or raw clay can acquire a smoky look. In addition, crazing is often induced through thermal shock. Greenbelt Recreation typically conducts firings twice annually using the city's portable, propane-fueled kiln. These firings are sociable affairs in which potters have the excitement of handling their own red-hot wares and the enjoyment of an instant "reveal" of their results.
- Improvements to the Community Center's kiln room ventilation are underway. An exhaust hood has been installed, and a new motor for it is on order. An opening has been created in an interior wall for air intake, and a fire-safe louvre is on order. All wares have been temporarily relocated out of the kiln room during the construction.
- Jurors have been selected to assist with the Artist in Residence program at the Community Center. Preparations are being made for the application review process which should yield selection decisions by the end of May for residencies beginning in July.
- Staff provided a proposal for the display of artwork in Council chambers, per Council's expressed interest.
- Currently on view in the art gallery Intricacies and Polarities: Meditations on the Natural World by Leslie Shellow. The show continues through June 2. Read about this exhibition in the April 11 edition of the Greenbelt News Review (page 16).
- Sculptures by Greenbelt artist and ceramics open studio participant Chris Corson are featured in a small solo show opening this week at the Maryland Federation of Art gallery located at 18 State Circle in Annapolis. A reception will be held on Sunday from 3-5pm. Read about Chris and his artwork in the April 18 edition of the Greenbelt New (page 12).
