#### Good afternoon,

This has been a busy couple of months for trees. I believe that changes in weather is grossly affecting any of our older trees that are under stress. Older trees are like people they cannot adjust as easy to environmental changes as the younger trees. I have provide answers to your questions or concerns below.

Heading towards Kenilworth on Crescent, I was referring to a large dead tree on the right just west of the center underpass and next to a walkway and the white apartments and to two dead trees on the left, probably on the red brick apartment property, just past the second underpass.

At 51 Crescent Rd. white oak has been in decline for the past couples of years and is scheduled for removal next week.

At 46 Crescent Rd. white oak that has been suffer from slime flux or bacterial wet wood for about three years. There is no treatment for this condition and normally does not kill a tree. This tree had a couple of dead limbs in the top of the tree and within 6 weeks whole tree was dead. It is scheduled for removal next week.

Address the health of the Eleanor Roosevelt tree—Davis (Brian Townsend)

This tree is a white ash that has been infested with emerald ash borer. It has only showed symptoms this spring of its internal damage. At this point it is too late for any treatment and will be looking for a appropriate replacement tree other than the ash tree. The ash was selected because it was one of Eleanor Roosevelt favorite childhood trees.

Address the amount of mulch on trees near Greenspring I and II – Mayor (Brian Townsend)

I will have the crew reduce areas that we find excessive mulch on trees and

landscaping. I will also speak to the Greenspring I & II home owner associations about reducing the amount of mulch that put on trees and landscape.

Address the health of pine trees on Hanover Parkway going toward Good Luck Road—Putens (Brian Townsend) Collected samples and getting it looked at by a plant pathologist. Suspected needle cast disease.


