City Manager's Report Week Ending October 11, 2019

- 1. WSSC emergency water line repair work near the intersection of Belle Pointe and American Legion Drive is anticipated to take a few weeks. An access road through WSSC's easement is being used. Mr. Sterling has reported that WSSC removed trees with the American Legion's approval.
- 2. Met with the Director of U.S.D.A. Beltsville Agricultural Research Center (BARC), Planning Director Terri Hruby, and Chief Richard Bowers. BARC staff confirmed that the Federal Bureau of Engraving project to be located at BARC has already been approved. For funding and land transfer. The U.S. Treasury Department obtained full funding. The environmental review process is underway. Preliminary Traffic Study information may be available later this Fall. Additional information should be ready in December. BARC officials will facilitate a December briefing with Treasury and Council. A community meeting was held two weeks ago.
- 3. BARC has significant infrastructure needs, from road repair and maintenance, to building renovation, to upgrading BARC's wastewater plant. An estimate of needed funding, particularly for the wastewater plant upgrade has been requested. Council consideration to include advocacy for Federal funding to address BARC infrastructure needs is recommended. BARC maintained roads and infrastructure impact Greenbelt residents working and driving through the area, as well as the local watershed.
- 4. BARC is awaiting Congressional funding to perform needed renovations to several buildings (Buildings #2, 3, 5, and 308). BARC officials shared that the Center received approval from Maryland historic preservation officials to demolish 24 buildings. This is a small number of the many empty and dilapidated structures in need of attention.
- 5. BARC officials confirmed that the Center has an effort to study and physically treat deer for ticks.
- 6. Conducted interviews for the City Treasurer position.
- 7. Ms. Terri Hruby, Planning Director, confirmed that the aerator was ordered for Greenbelt Lake. Residents and visitors should continue to expect the water level to be lowered during the project.
- 8. Approved two additional police hires. These new hires will work as cadets before heading to the next academy class.
- 9. In discussion with Crowne Plaza management, with the exception of 38 rooms, the guest room renovations are almost complete; renovation construction will stop soon and restart in December. This will allow the hotel to function for the remainder of the season without interruption to the guests (as lobby work will be next, followed by the restaurant, etc.). There is a new general contractor. Otherwise, the property received high guest ratings during the first quarter during renovation. I will follow-up with the other hotel managers who shared that changes were anticipated and/or underway at their properties also.
- 10. Attended a Council work session closed session, Strong Towns presentation, the Rotary Club and Greenbelt East Community meetings.

CITY OF GREENBELT PROGRAM OPEN SPACE FY 2020 ANNUAL PROGRAM (Revised 10/9/19)

Justification & Narrative Description of Projects

The following materials are intended to clarify the City of Greenbelt's submission for the FY 2020 Program Open Space (POS) Annual Program. The City's FY 2020 Annual Program includes three development projects and one land acquisition project.

Status of FY 2019 POS Annual Program & Encumbered Projects

The City's FY 2019 POS Annual Program submission consisted of one development project and one acquisition project. The City's FY 2019 development project, *Buddy Attick Park Master Plan Improvements*, is currently awaiting County permit approval. The City anticipates soliciting bids from eligible contractors this summer and for construction to begin in the fall of 2019.

The acquisition project, *Greenbelt Parkland Acquisition*, remains on hold as no acquisition projects have presented themselves to the City. If an opportunity arises the City will revise its annual program to be more site specific.

The City did complete a number of POS projects in FY 2019 including the following: Community Center Facility Upgrades, Greenbelt Aquatic and Fitness Center Upgrades Phase IV and the Community Center Playground Renovation project. The City has an additional project, Greenbelt Aquatic and Fitness Center Upgrades Phase II, that has received Board of Public Works approval but that project is currently on hold.

Justification for FY 2020 Projects

The City is strongly committed to protecting diminishing open space resources and providing quality recreational facility for its residents. The City's philosophy and policy commitment to this goal are set forth in the City's adopted goals action plan. This goals action plan includes an open space component, which defines a broad goal "to protect and increase Greenbelt's open space," and then spells out 12 objectives to achieve this goal.

The following is a brief description of and justification for the City's three proposed projects:

Buddy Attick Park Master Plan Improvements (D-GI): In 1992, the Greenbelt City Council adopted the Buddy Attick Park Master Plan. The 90+ acre park provides a wide variety of recreational opportunities to the City's residents, as well as visitors from around the Washington Metropolitan region. This project involves implementing certain recommendations of the Master Plan including implementing "green" parking lot

improvements, installing a kiosk at the main entrance to the park and redesigning the entrance to the park from parking facilities.

The City has received grant funding to implement certain aspects of this project. Planning and engineering are complete for this project and the City is currently in the Prince George's County permitting process, and anticipates this project going to construction within the next few months.

The project is consistent with the 2009 Maryland Planning Visions and the Prince George's County Park and Recreation Goals. The project will involve public participation in the planning and design of improvements. The project supports the City's commitment to resource conservation, land stewardship and the provision of high quality sustainable recreational/environmental resources.

Lakecrest Tennis Court Improvements (D-G2): This project proposes to undertake improvements to two courts at the Lakecrest Tennis Courts. The courts are in poor condition and in need of resurfacing and minor repairs. Work to be undertaken includes new color coating and minor surface repairs as needed. The courts are widely used by the tennis community and have benefited from Program Open Space funding in the past.

The project is consistent with the 2009 Maryland Planning Visions and the Prince George's County Park and Recreation Goals. The project supports the City's commitment to resource conservation, land stewardship and the provision of high quality sustainable recreational/environmental resources.

Playground Renovations, 2 Court Research Road (D-G3): The City proposes to renovate an existing playground that is located in the historic core of the community. The playground serves young children and will be designed to be ADA and CPSC compliant.

The existing playground has aging equipment that is no longer compliant with current safety guidelines. The City will collaborate with Greenbelt Homes, Inc. on the design and installation of the new playground, per an existing playground agreement.

The project is consistent with the 2009 Maryland Planning Visions and the Prince George's County Park and Recreation Goals. The project will involve public participation in the planning and design of improvements. The project supports the City's commitment to resource conservation, land stewardship and the provision of high quality sustainable recreational/environmental resources.

Greenbelt Parkland Acquisition (A-G1): This project proposes the acquisition of unspecified acres of undeveloped land for use as passive and/or active parkland. While the City is not able to identify a specific parcel of land for acquisition at this time, by

including this project in its annual program it will be in a better position to react if a parcel of land becomes available that the City has identified as having open space/recreation value. This project is consistent with both the City's goal to protect open space as well as the State's 2009 Planning Visions that advocate environmental protection, resource conservation and local stewardship efforts.
