Regional Experts Recommend Greenbelt Road Improvements



Over a day and a half in June, College Park, Berwyn Heights, and Greenbelt, along with the Council of Governments (COG), private sector planners, and real estate and business leaders, spent time touring, brainstorming, planning and discussing improvements to the

Greenbelt Road Corridor. The Technical Assistance Panel (TAP), selected by the Urban Land Washington Institute (ULI), held sessions at the Springhill Lake Recreation Center.

TAPs provide expert, multidisciplinary advice to public agencies and non-profit organizations facing complex land use and real estate issues in the Washington metropolitan area. The panel spent time listening to and moderating the sessions where ideas were shared.

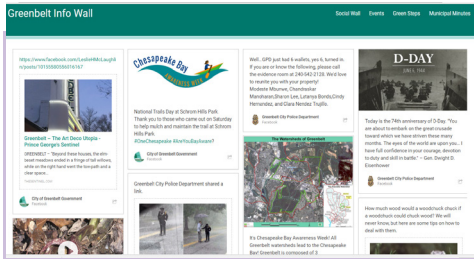

Remove Mosquito Habitats

Mosquitoes need water for two stages of their life cycle, it's important to monitor standing water sources.



- Every time it rains get rid of standing water in old tires, buckets, plastic covers, toys or any other container where mosquitoes can breed.
- During the wet months check at least once a week check rain gutters and potted plant trays.
- Periodically change the water in bird baths, fountains, and wading pools.
- Drain temporary pools of water or fill with dirt.
- Keep swimming pool water treated and circulating.

HOW TO HANDLE WILDLIFE

Greenbelt Animal Control routinely receives calls about wildlife. Most of the questions can be resolved by humans acting proactively.

The best and most humane approach to dealing with wildlife is to eliminate what may be attracting the animal.

Laws dictate that an animal may not be trapped and relocated. Trapping and removing the animal(s) does not solve the problem; it simply leaves a void for another animal to fill. Consideration should be given to the time of year, the species' breeding period, gestation period and when they birth their young. Trapping may leave behind orphaned wildlife that may not be able to survive without their mother.

The most common attractants for wildlife are garbage and pet food being left out. Since wildlife are opportunistic, eliminating the food source will move the animal along. Securing trash can lids with bungee cords, a screw top garbage can, a wooden container for your trash cans with a locking lid and only putting trash out the morning it will be collected are some ideas on keeping the free buffet harder to get into. Speak with your neighbors if their trash receptacles need to be better secured.

It's a misconception that a nocturnal animal is rabid when seen out during the day. Most times they are hungry and know food is available during that time. Contact Animal Control immediately at 301-474-6124 or 301-474-7200, if you see an animal walking in circles, falling over, dragging themselves, acting unusually aggressive or injured. Those are indications the animal maybe rabid or sick.

Wildneighbors.org is a great online resource for information on specific species. The better we understand our wild neighbors, the more we can appreciate their role in our eco-systems and how they benefit our world.

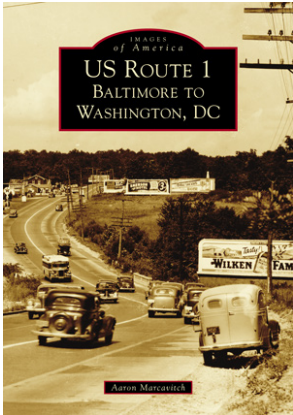
