City Manager's Report Week Ending September 4, 2020

- 1. Attached please find a confidential memo on a legal matter.
- 2. As reported yesterday, and in follow-up to the County Executive's press conference, the County is not progressing to Stage 3 at this time. Beverly Palau has posted a link to the press conference. The County officials are concerned about the County's infection and positive rates possibly rising, particularly after this holiday weekend. As of the date of this report, according to the County dashboard, Zip Code 20770 has had 631 confirmed positive cases.
- 3. Regarding the City facilities, there is no change in status. As noted during Wednesday's work session, the Youth Center restrooms are open to the public. The public can also purchase tennis tokens. Staff anticipates repair work and continued coordination between Recreation and Public Works regarding expanded public access to the Youth Center and the Fitness Wing of the Aquatic and Fitness Center.
- 4. Greg Varda and Recreation staff will begin implementing an additional 80 plus classes in various forms, primarily outdoors, virtual, and if in person, a very small group (like 2-3 people in the ceramics studio or a class in the gym). An announcement is anticipated within the next few weeks regarding additional services.
- 5. Principal McNeill reports that residents will be able to use the Eleanor Roosevelt High School Track starting Tuesday, September 8. The track will be available from 7 am to 12 pm. Residents will enter the track using the turn style. As reported yesterday, Mr. McNeill explained that the "temporaries" located at the high school are for other schools. The temporaries will be there for a short time and then be moved.
- 6. Reviewed the draft GFOA budget award submission developed by Anne Marie Belton.
- 7. Two public meeting permits were approved and noted for your interest: Greenbelt Elementary School PTA book donation drop-off activity (located behind the Co-op on Sunday, September 6th) and a multi-day Democratic Club voter registration/absentee vote information table (located in front of the Pop-up Theatre from mid-September through October). Recreation also issued a permit for the Club at Schrom Hills Park's shelter. Lt. Gulledge and park rangers have been made aware of the activities and will monitor accordingly.

I apologize for the delay, we have had folks in and out so it took some time to make sure we were not missing anything.

Last school year, the SRO made six criminal arrests and issued 45 traffic citations. This does not reflect the number of incidents he investigated, but was able to resolve through the school administration. The traffic enforcement was done before and after school increase pedestrian safety. Additionally the SRO teaches a Police Procedures and Concepts class. Works with school staff and parents to address student behavioral issues through mentoring and de-escalates conflicts between students.

Fiscal Year General Fund 2020 Revenue

FY 2020 General Fund revenue is currently \$30,310,628 or approximately \$1.5 million lower than the estimate in the FY 2021 Proposed Budget document. An income tax payment of approximately \$300,000 will be received from the State on August 31st. This payment will be credited to FY 2020. Therefore, staff estimates that FY 2020 General Fund revenue will fall \$1.2 million short of the estimate in the adopted budget.

There is one large revenue payment that was due in FY 2020 that will not be received in time to credit FY 2020 revenues, apartment rental fees of \$316,000 from Franklin Park. It is important to note that while the \$316,000 will not be credited to FY 2020, these monies are not lost and will be paid after negotiating with the owners of the property (which is the preferred method), placing a tax lien on the property, or some other method to ensure the City of Greenbelt is paid in full. The result is that the delinquent rental fee revenue will be credited to FY 2021.

Overall, the reductions in revenue are a direct result of the economy shutting down in March 2020. The revenues most affected were corporate personal property (\$194,000), hotel/motel (\$379,000), highway user (\$161,000), recreation including the fitness and community centers (\$578,000), and parking fines (\$95,000).

Lastly, it should be noted that Admissions & Amusement taxes are unusually high given theaters have been shut down since March. The City received a payment of \$356,344 for back payments due the City for the period October 2017 to January 2019. When the AMC Theaters were sold a few years ago, the new owners registered the theaters as located in Prince George's County, but not in the City of Greenbelt. Finance staff worked this matter for several years until it was resolved with the City receiving all monies due.

Fiscal Year General Fund 2020 Expenditures

General Fund revenue is currently \$29,443,620 or \$1.6 million less than the estimate in the FY 2021 Adopted Budget. As mentioned in the July report, the City responded quickly by holding vacant positions open and delaying capital projects if possible. As a result, the reductions in revenue are similar to the reduction in expenditures.

A few notable expenditure reductions are salaries (\$800,000), overtime (\$200,000), professional services (\$65,000), utilities (\$77,000), and motor equipment maintenance (\$114,000) which includes \$79,000 for gasoline/diesel.

It is unknown how long COVID-19 will be a daily part of everyday life. However, one thing is certain, the "V" shape recovery predicted by many in the financial community is unlikely to happen. The road to recovery will require patience and time to repair. That said, it is a road Greenbelt is well prepared to travel.

REDEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY ANNOUNCES GROUNDBREAKING OF A \$34 MILLION SENIOR APARTMENT COMPLEX

Largo, MD ---- The Redevelopment Authority of Prince George's County (RDA) serves as the Master Developer of the Towne Square at Suitland Federal Center and is pleased to announce the groundbreaking of the next major development project at the Towne Square, the Suitland Senior Apartments.

"We are Prince George's Proud that the Suitland Seniors Apartments project is officially underway, which will provide quality and affordable housing for our County's seniors," said Prince George's County Executive Angela Alsobrooks. "The Towne Square at Suitland Federal Center will be a vibrant, mixed-used development that will attract quality retail to the area, and we are excited that this development project and so many others continue to move forward across the County as we work to recover from this pandemic stronger than we've ever been before."

The Suitland Senior Apartments is a new \$34 million complex with 137-units that will serve individuals age 62 years and over. It will feature a rooftop terrace, a yoga room, fitness center, game room and club room. Laundry rooms will be located on each floor and 21 units will have in-unit washers and dryers. The building is designed to meet strict "green criteria," which includes Energy Star appliances and other measures, resulting in healthy homes with low utility costs.

"We are excited about the addition of this new state-of-the-art apartment complex for seniors," said Stephen Paul, Executive Director of the RDA. "The Towne Square at Suitland Federal Center is a pedestrian-friendly community and seniors will have a wealth of amenities right at their front door."

The building will have 72 units at 50% Average Median Income (AMI) rents, 45 units at 60% AMI, 16 units at 80% AMI, and 4 units that are unrestricted, or market rate. The project will take advantage of the new income averaging law so that the 80% units will qualify under the Low Income Housing Tax Credit program. Pre-leasing will begin in October 2021 and the complex's completion date is early 2022.

Upon completion, the Towne Square at Suitland Federal Center will be an active and vibrant mixed-use, pedestrian-oriented community that enhances the lifestyles of residents of the immediate and surrounding neighborhoods. The site is part of a mixed-use subdivision consisting of 219 town houses, 538 market rate multi-family units, 137 senior units, 80,000 square feet of retail and up to 50,000 square feet of public uses including an arts center and public plaza. The Towne Square at Suitland Federal Center site is approximately 25 acres and is located a half mile from the Suitland Metro Station and across the street from the U.S. Census Bureau Headquarters.

The development team for the Suitland Senior Apartments includes Mission First Housing Development Corporation, The Henson Development Company and the L.A. Bolden Company. The development team is partnering with the White Rose Foundation, a 501©3 organization and part of The Links, Inc., to provide office space in the building to specifically serve Suitland area seniors. RDA is the land owner for the Towne Square at Suitland Federal Center and has established a long-term lease with Mission First Housing Development Corporation.

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
