GREENBELT CHOSEN AS LOCATION FOR FBI HEADQUARTERS



In a statement released by the U.S. General Services Administration (GSA), Greenbelt has been chosen as the site for the new home for the FBI headquarters: "GSA determined Greenbelt to be the best option for the FBI and the United States government because the site was the lowest cost to taxpayers, provided the greatest transportation access to FBI employees and visitors, and gave the government the most certainty on project delivery schedule. It also provided the highest potential to advance sustainability and equity."

Governor Wes Moore, alongside a delegation from the State of Maryland, held a press conference in the Greenbelt Municipal Building on Friday, November 10. More stated that that the FBI's relocation to Greenbelt will "bring more than 7,500 new job and generate more than \$4 billion in economic activity."

City Manager Update

Dear Greenbelt Residents.

As I reflect on my initial four months as your City Manager, my heart is full of gratitude. The warmth and support you've extended, not only to me but to my entire family, have been truly overwhelming. We are delighted to have settled into a GHI home, a testament to the welcoming spirit of Greenbelt, where neighbors jumped in to help us find a home.

In this short period, we've witnessed historic milestones and tackled challenges head-on. The recent Election stands as a beacon of progress, marking the first time Greenbelt elected a womenled Council and its first African American Councilwoman. Our strides in community development are evident by helping 15 families become homeowners via mortgage down payment assistance, providing scholarships to 29 students, and investing \$1.1M+ to 37 businesses in Recovery and Improvement grants.

Yet, our journey hasn't been without its tribulations. Crime remains a pressing concern, and in response, we are gearing up to introduce License Plate Reading Cameras in 2024 to aid in the early detection of stolen vehicles. Amidst our strides and setbacks, the loss of Council Member Ric Gordon has been profoundly felt. Ric was a pillar of support during my transition. I miss his optimism, kindness, and love for everything Greenbelt.

Looking ahead, 2024 holds immense promise for Greenbelt. In Spring 2024, we will inaugurate two new playgrounds: Springhill Lake Recreation and an Inclusive Playground at Buddy Attick Park. We are also modernizing our fleet with five new vehicles for our police force and introducing two new electric vehicles and new EV Charging Infrastructure at the Library.

The recognition as the new FBI headquarters, coupled with pivotal healthcare developments like the new women's health facility adjacent to Greenbelt at Luminis Health Doctors Community Medical Center and a county-run public health facility, underscores Greenbelt's significance, growth and opportunities.

Greenbelt's Bring Your Own Bag Ordinance Begins on January 1, 2024

ON JANUARY 1, 2024, the City of Greenbelt's Bring Your Own Bag ordinance, and Prince George's County's similar Better Bag Bill, go into effect to reduce single-use plastic bag use and litter.

WHAT DOES THIS MEAN? Greenbelt retail establishments will be prohibited from providing plastic carryout bags to shoppers. If a customer requests a paper bag or reusable bag at the point of sale, the customer must pay at least 10 cents for each bag, with certain exceptions.

WHO IS AFFECTED? All retail stores, restaurants, grocery stores, or any other establishment that provides single-use plastic bags to its customers, whether for-profit or not-for-profit.

WHY? To protect the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the city and to prevent and remove public nuisances. To protect the environment and marine life. Plastic carryout bags are rarely recyclable and impose costs to local and county government, taxpayers in the form of removal of litter and repair and wear-and-tear on recycling machinery due to the improper disposal of plastic bags in recycling bins. Single-use plastic bags are made from fossil fuels, contributing to climate change.



WHICH BAGS ARE BANNED? Only single-use plastic film bags given at the point of sale are banned. It does not include a plastic or paper bag used to package or contain bulk items such as fruit, vegetables, nuts, grains, candy, or small hardware items; fresh meat or seafood; flowers, potted plants, or other damp items; unwrapped prepared foods or bakery goods; dry-cleaned clothes; or a plastic bag used to take live fish, insects, mollusks, or crustaceans away from the retail establishment.

HOW DOES THE PAPER BAG FEE WORK? Greenbelt retail establishments must charge at least 10 cents for each paper or reusable bag provided at the point of sale, except for paper bags: containing prescription medications provided by a pharmacy; given by full service restaurants for customers to take leftovers; and for food provided at fast food restaurant take out windows. The entire bag charge is kept by the retailer, none by the City of Greenbelt.

WHAT SHOULD YOU DO? Bring your own bags when shopping, or take purchases without a bag. Greenbelt businesses not complying with the ban may be fined. Shoppers, please comply. Don't place our Greenbelt businesses in an awkward position by asking for an exception.

GET A FREE BAG ON US! Residents can stop by the Greenbelt Municipal Building, located at 25 Crescent Road, to pick up a reusable bag from 8:30 am - 3:30 pm. Quantities are limited.


Quarterly Electronics and Styrofoam Recycling

Greenbelt Nursery Project

The Greenbelt Assistance in Living program is excited to bring back the Greenbelt Nursery Project! This program provides up to 6 at-home bi-weekly nursing visits from university-level student nurses for women in their second or third trimester, and children newborn to age 3. Student nurses provide child development assessments and provide social service referral, diapers, formula, wipes, baby hygiene supplies, adult hygiene supplies and other baby products.

Family must live in Greenbelt, have eligible children ages newborn to 3 years old, children who wear diapers.

With up to two 6 bi-weeklyhome visits from nursing students; **Session 1** is from January 17 - Februrary 28, **Session 2** is from March 13 - April 24.
